After an extensive evaluation of the Project Proposal "Respirar es Vivir" the Comittee of the Yucatan's Chapter approved the purchase of a portable oxygen concentrator for the community in Muna.

It was determined that the portable oxygen concentrator will provide affordable care to patients in Muna suffering from respiratory conditions or illnesses under the guidance of licensed medical professionals.

Scholarship for Indigenous Youth in Yaxunah

Project idea

Provide young indigenous people from Yaxunah financial incentives to continue their studies and encourage their personal, academic, and professional development.

The problem

Over the years, many young indigenous people from Yaxunah can't continue studying due to financial limitations.

How will they be selected?

The criteria to be selected to receive the financial aid is:

- 1. To be a student (or candidate to an academic program)
- 2. To have a minimum of 80 average score in previous program.

- 3. Provide official documentation of being enrolled in an academic program (Student ID, admission letter, grade report, or other).
- 4. To be part of "Grupo Juvenil Indígena de Compañeros de las Américas" for the duration of the financial support and to take part on the activities of the organization.

How can the financial aid will be used?

The budget (donations) can cover the following expenses:

Lodging, food, transportation, tuition and other fees, admission exams, prep courses, and language classes.

This year's budget

\$900 USD

Will benefit 11 students (18 – 33 years old)



Sustainable water harvesting

Project idea

Provide the community with an effective rainwater harvesting system to expand the availability of water during dry season and/or crisis (ex: hurricane season).

The problem

The community Tigre Grande in Tzucacab doesn't have access to drinkable water due to lack of water extraction equipment, ineffective public water supply system, and geographical conditions.

Our updates

Tax exemption

In recent months, there's been many changes in the legislation regarding NGO and taxes. There's a high probability of more changes in the following months.

We have made progress in the long process to become an NGO with tax exemption, but we are still awaiting a response from the Office for the Treasury and Public Credit.

We will keep you posted.

Tax declaration

As of January 2021, we are required by law to declare our taxes as a legal NGO.

We require an accountant to help us with our monthly tax declaration. Even if we don't have any income as an NGO, we still are required to declare it. This has become our administrative expense every month.

We are looking for a specialist in accounting for NGOs to give us a basic training and guidance towards which administrative path we should take to comply with the law.
